KAREN: **Non**, Students can sometimes get a bit bored especially sort of mid-way through the module, when you have been reading your text books and things. What can they come to the library for to inspire them about something they might be studying.

N: Well we don't just have text based resources in the online collections, there are lots of rich materials in there, there are image databases in there, there are sound databases in there and there are broadcast resources, so there are lots of things to raid in the online library, not just simply articles or chapters of books.

KAREN: A lot of our students will be putting ideas together for the Student Connections Conference, so they might be interested in maybe having a looking back at some of this material and they might want to use some of that in their presentation. Is that something they could get in touch with the library about?

N: Well, I'm very much hoping that we librarians, the team they have here, are actually going to be part of the conference and offering little drop in sessions or possibly online tutorial sessions on how to do this very thing, how to use some of the jazzier materials if you like in a creative way.

KAREN: And can you also say a little bit about students sort of broadening their horizons because sometimes in the hum drum of everyday life, especially in TMAs, there are so many interesting things to find out about, but so little time as well and I know that is a pressure for a lot of our students. What would you say some of the benefits are about broadening experience in a way like this?

N: Well, I think these days, as we become more digital everything is becoming more and more digital and it is impacting on all of our daily lives now, so much more of us is having to write tax returns and vote on line and you can see that's the direction of travel. So being able to cope in complex environments and navigate your way through all of those digital resources and services confidently and the **manager** of information as well as you are going through that is going to be a key skill, a key digital information literacy skill going forward.

KAREN: All of this stuff sounds so interesting, I for one am just getting use to Twitter and things like that and how nice it must be to actually like feel you are adding to your knowledge whilst doing something trendy, enjoyable and now.

N: Absolutely and you can share some of things you are creating with others. So you can use forums that we provide or there is a whole raft of things we have the Facebook channel as well, you know there is a whole range of other channels that you can chose to share these things with. We also as

librarians we need to be where the students are as well or where they want us to be and where we can provide the most effective help.

KAREN: Thank you very much for joining me today.

Interview with Matt Staples

MS: Well obviously we have got TMA01 coming up quite soon and the focus of that TMA01 for DD101 is really outlining how some people on the street benefit and also how others lose and we are asking students to really focus on a street that they know. One way of doing this perhaps is maybe thinking about the street where I live, I live in North London and I think like many streets across the country we have been affected by the recession quite badly, because I'm a Social Scientist and quite like quantities methods I actually counted the number of shops on the street quite recently and saw how many had closed, and so I think the impact of the recession has significantly affected small businesses. They can't compete with online shopping and a number of traders who have been around for a long time have actually gone under in the last couple of years. So immediately you can see there are people who have lost on the street, smaller traders are losing out to maybe bigger businesses and also to online shopping. Alternatively, there are impacts there of course for consumers as well. People have to go further away to do their shopping. Ultimately you could also argue there is a real issue of social inequality and social deprivation because people have lost their jobs and that will have an impact in terms of who is actually losing out, now in terms of who benefits, different groups on a street will focus on different things, there may be new restaurants or alternative shops that have opened basically and they will attract particular group of customers. And so it is about thinking of the street as always influx, just like any other parts of society its constantly been made and remade and so its thinking about any given moment will there be people who have benefited from what's on the street and are there examples of people who will be losing out.

KAREN: And now it's time for the news. OK, so this week we are launching our new website so go and check out the new video that I was not in and you can also most importantly register for the conference. Now Dave what happens when students register?
