
Karen:

I'm going to be talking about something which I think everybody is familiar with so when you're going out in town or in a village, a new building is going up. 9 times out of 10 on the hoarding's around the building site there will be an image of what the building is going to look like when it's finished. Those images are created digitally know and erm and that's what I'm going to be talking about, how they're made.

Karen.

Great, fantastic cause you're actually, you went out as a researcher and conducted this research, can you tell us like, what's the most interesting thing for you that came out of it was.

Gillian:

Yeah I mean one of the pleasures of research is always going to places that I would never otherwise of been able to get to (laughs) and what we were doing in relation to those images is look at images and how they were produced. So I got into architects offices and visualised studios and so on and peered over the shoulders of these really creative people, and got to see them at work, creating these things that when you see them they look so finished, perfect, glossy but to actually see the iterate process and the current technologies that are being used to create them was fascinating.

Karen:

Fantastic. So I'm interviewing Ruth Tudor, you're doing a talk at the Student Connections Conference, can you tell us what you're going to be talking about?

Ruth:

Yes I'm going to be talking about the charging to use the NHS.

Karen:

And what interested you in this issue?

Ruth:

Erm it was the social inequality that we felt was quite important because charging a flat rate to use the NHS is going to effect, you know, no matter how cheap it is or how expensive it is, it's going to introduce a social inequality into how we use the NHS and how we access the NHS.

Fantastic, and you've worked on this through the active session haven't you with Patricia Bates. Can you tell me a little bit about how you've come together and how you've both worked on this presentation?

Ruth:

Yes certainly, we met over the, through the activate team sessions and it was a case of when we were deciding what to talk about, we both expressed an interest in the same thing erm and we talked to each other through the activate sessions and then because we weren't always able to manage them, we swapped e-mails and continued our conversations that way. Erm and then sat down together, well on-line together over the weekend and erm and worked together to get it all done
