Rachel MacLeod:

I'm Rachel MacLeod and I'm here with Mike Bullivant with a Behind the Scenes interview about recording series two of This Student Life. So firstly Mike, hi and welcome.

Why do you think this series is important for students?

Mike Bullivant:

Studying with the OU can be a pretty terrifying experience. And it's this kind of material that will help students overcome that fear and that anxiety and help them with their studies. I think it's really important.

Rachel MacLeod:

That's perfect. I think confidence is quite a big issue for many students especially when they're starting out with their studies.

Mike Bullivant:

Well a lot of students haven't studied for years, perhaps since they were at school. It's such a strange experience, even writing an essay. It can be intimidating. It can be a fearsome thing. And the more help that the Open University can give through things like this, initiatives like this then I think that's better for students.

Rachel MacLeod:

How do you think that your character contributes to student experiences?

Mike Bullivant:

There must be quite a few OU students whose partners or whose families unfortunately don't support them in what they're doing.

Doing an OU course for the first time and taken the decision to take an OU course is an important one. It's a difficult choice to make not only from the perspective of the student but also from the people who are going to, not suffer, I don't want to use that word, but that are going to be effected by OU studies. It is very time consuming. The Open University doesn't give its degrees away, you have to work hard for it. And often the people that pay the price of that are the close relatives, spouses, children, they can be the casualty of the OU, they needn't necessarily be.

Now some families, some students don't have the support of their family and spouses as I say, and Ted is one of those awful characters. And so Ted is in the script I guess to show what an effect that can have on an OU student and undermining it can be. Ted is not a nice character. It's all about me. He name should be Me Me. Me, me, me, me me, it's all about me and his golf club and that's far more important. And just offering ... when you get home from work, how did you get on with your studies today? It doesn't cost much. Just showing a little bit of interest.

But the OU is a wonderful institution. It does give lots of support. It is a very supportive institution, perhaps more so than other university in the UK, university that I know.

Rachel MacLeod:

If I could ask you a little bit about how you found the experience this week? How has it been taking part in this series?

Mike Bullivant:

It's really good. I get invited to be involved in it and then you get sent a script. And then we have a read through. But it's been fun. It always is fun working with Dave, Dave Middleton.

I notice he's written himself a very funny part. This is the second series of This Student Life. In the first series Dave hardly featured at all, in this series now Dave has written the script with Karen, or Karen wrote it with Dave. And he's written himself a bigger part. And I notice the part that I play, Ted, is a lot smaller than it was last year.

And what I fear is that if we do ever get to do a third series of This Student Life then the opening lines will be, a table 00:11:45 will be written out and the opening lines will be something like, as Ted's coffin slips behind the curtains of the crematorium.

Tatiana Blackmore:

Yes, I believe the role of the tutor in the university is one of the most important ones. Yes, we do deal with OU students on a daily basis and I suppose we are on the front line and we are just dealing with any queries and helping our students on this learning journey.

Dave Middleton:

Fabulous. Now I've got two DD102 tutors with me here. And we're also going to have quite a few students who are doing DD102 and I know that they are very nervous. Many of them would have just got their TMA 1 back and just received their feedback and their marks. Any advice you want to give them?

Tatiana Blackmore:

Yes. I think, you know, first of all congratulations to everybody who has actually overcome the barrier and fear of submitting TMA 1. So 1 is done, a few more to go. So the next TMA is coming up very soon and I know that this TMA might feel a bit more daunting because it's an essay so a little bit different.

What I would like, kind of advice to the students is that you might find that TMA 02 will be harder to write. So just take it in your stride and take on board all the advice that tutors give you.

Karen Foley:

Absolutely. Yeah, I think sometimes tutors forget just how important they are to students. Because like you say they're on the front line there.

Tatiana Blackmore:

Yes indeed. And I think that's why I always keep saying to my students, well don't suffer in silence and just don't be ashamed to, or don't feel awkward to actually drop email,

make a phone call to your tutors and just say, I'm a little bit stuck or I'm not sure about this course material.

Karen Foley:

Brilliant.

Dave Middleton:

Tatiana, I've got to say, you're wearing a lovely bracelet there which is smashing against the desk as you speak, so we're just picking up that little bit of background noise, never mind about that.
